International Criminal Law

Learn the elements, theories and applications of genocide, crimes against humanity, war crimes and aggression, as well as the types of international tribunals that prosecute suspects. (3 credits)

The Impact of the Holocaust on the Law

Explore how a major societal event like the Holocaust can have a lasting effect on the development of international and domestic law, and learn about the conspiracies within Nazi Germany that lead to the prosecution of this ultimate crime. (3 credits)



International Criminal Law Moot Court

Participate as a lawyer, witness or expert in a mock court session that combines teams of American, German and international law students who brief their cases and present arguments at the end of the semester before officials of the International Criminal Court. Oral arguments are held in Old Courtroom Number 600 in the Nuremberg Palace of Justice, where Nazi war leaders were prosecuted after World War II.

From Nuremberg to The Hague

The Creighton University School of Law's Nuremberg Summer Program (commonly called N2H), gives you the chance to study international criminal law and the Holocaust in Nuremberg, the Bavarian city that hosted the Nazi war crimes trials after World War II. You'll spend the month of July with us in Germany, Austria, the Netherlands and Poland. You'll study international law and how traumatic events like the Holocaust impact the law. You'll also explore the theoretical and practical reaches of major international crimes.

By combining classroom instruction with trips to actual crime scenes, places of conspiracy and current trials, you will be exposed to an unrivaled array of historical and legal experiences.

Experiences

Dachau, Germany, and Auschwitz, Poland

You'll visit two concentration and extermination camps within the SS-orchestrated detention system under Germany's Nazi regime. Dachau is just outside of Munich, while Auschwitz is in modern-day Poland. At Dachau, you'll observe how the early Nazi party orchestrated personal and political oppression. While at Auschwitz, you will visit "Exhibit A," the largest crime scene of the Holocaust—demonstrating the magnitude of the Final Solution as part of a weekend in Krakow, Poland.

Hitler's Eagles Nest

Experience the intensity of exploring a major place of conspiracy at Berchtesgaden. Juxtaposed against the striking beauty of the Bavarian Alps, Hitler's mountain retreat is preserved as it was found after World War II.
